CHILDREN IN WORSHIP

There is an open space to the front right of the pews for children 5 and under to play under your supervision and a changing station for parents of our youngest members under the church in the restrooms.

HOLY COMMUNION

We offer God's gracious gift of Holy Communion to anyone who wishes to receive it. If you prefer to receive a blessing, come forward and cross your arms over your chest. Let the priest or minister know if you would need a gluten-free wafer. We are also happy to bring Communion to you if you are unable to come to the altar rail. Please let an usher know if this would be helpful for you.

PARKING

On Sundays, reduced-rate parking is available at R.O.W. Parking Garage (50 E. Ohio) for \$2 for up to six hours from the time of entering the garage. Discounts are also available for all-day parking at Ohio Ontario Self Park (33 W. Ontario) for \$11. To receive a reducedrate parking voucher, please go to the welcome table in the narthex or the reception desk in the Welcome Center.





Liturgy of the Word

FIRST READING

A Reading from the Letter of James. (2:1-4, 14-17)

My friends, if you have faith in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ, you won't treat some people better than others. Suppose a rich person wearing fancy clothes and a gold ring comes to one of your meetings. And suppose a poor person dressed in worn-out clothes also comes. You must not give the best seat to the one in fancy clothes and tell the one who is poor to stand at the side or sit on the floor. That is the same as saying that some people are better than others, and you would be acting like a crooked judge.

My friends, what good is it to say you have faith, when you don't do anything to show that you really do have faith? Can that kind of faith save you? If you know someone who doesn't have any clothes or food, you shouldn't just say, "I hope all goes well for you. I hope you will be warm and have plenty to eat." What good is it to say this, unless you do something to help? Faith that doesn't lead us to do good deeds is all alone and dead!

HOLY GOSPEL

GospellerThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. (7:24-37)AllGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus left that place and went to the area around Tyre. When he went into a house, he did not want anyone to know he was there, but he could not stay hidden. A woman whose daughter had an evil spirit in her heard that he was there. So she quickly came to Jesus and fell at his feet. She was Greek, born in Phoenicia, in Syria. She begged Jesus to force the demon out of her daughter.

Jesus told the woman, "It is not right to take the children's bread and give it to the dogs. First let the children eat all they want." But she answered, "Yes, Lord, but even the dogs under the table can eat the children's crumbs." Then Jesus said, "Because of your answer, you may go. The demon has left your daughter." The woman went home and found her daughter lying in bed; the demon was gone.

Then Jesus left the area around Tyre and went through Sidon to Lake Galilee, to the area of the Ten Towns. While he was there, some people brought a man to him who was deaf and could not talk plainly. The people begged Jesus to put his hand on the man to heal him.

Jesus led the man away from the crowd, by himself. He put his fingers in the man's ears and then spit and touched the man's tongue. Looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to the man, "Ephphatha!" (This means, "Be opened.") Instantly the man was able to hear and to use his tongue so that he spoke clearly.

Jesus commanded the people not to tell anyone about what happened. But the more he commanded them, the more they told about it. They were completely amazed and said, "Jesus does everything well. He makes the deaf hear! And those who can't talk he makes able to speak."
